## **Empowering Youth to Vote** Indiana County High Schools Win Civic Engagement Awards

Each year the Governor of Pennsylvania recognizes the efforts of high school students to educate their fellow students about the voting process. In May 2023, two Indiana County high schools received the Governor's Civic Engagement Award at Gold Level, among 37 Gold Level high school winners statewide.

Indiana Area Senior High School and Purchase Line High School won these awards for registering 85 percent or more of their students eligible to vote. Student Ambassadors and their high schools received a plaque and certificates from the the Pennsylvania Secretary of State. The League of Women Voters of Indiana County encouraged students in the Class of 2023 to increase their understanding of voting and elections by providing information about the GCEA program to school district superintendents and providing LWVIC voting information cards to senior high school students.

# Saturday began with breakout rooms and then the convention at 9 a.m.

Susan Boser led a breakout session on "Growing diverse membership with a DEI lens."

Another session highlighted climate change. Session leaders recommended the book *Draw-down* by Paul Hawken, which we will be buying. They noted we should be calling it Climate Emergency rather than Climate Change. There is a climate interest group in the LWV and if you are interested they are recruiting participants.

Six rather than "Five Rs" were highlighted: Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Rot (compost) and Repair instead of buying new all the time.

The main convention on Saturday included a lot of organization business: adoption of rules, treasurers reports, budget, bylaws adoptions and election of officers and directors.

# Sunday breakout rooms highlighted several topics.

The LWVPA board structure taskforce is looking into revamping board structure and how things are done. Other breakout sessions discussed PA Youth Vote, Fair Districts, and Navigating NON Partisanship during a hyper partisan time a very interesting presentation.

At the conclusion of convention business, the audience was asked for guidance to the board in planning the next conference.

During the convention we were honored to accept the 2023 Democracy Defender Award in recognition of our outstanding services to voters.

It was a great opportunity to meet members from other Leagues, do some networking and learn about resources that we can utilize.

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## What on Earth Is Happening? The Inflation Reduction Act and Climate Aid

If you've wondered about the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (IRA), what it is, what's in it and how it can help you, here are resources and information to help you take advantage of this landmark act.

The IRA is the most significant climate legislation ever passed in the U.S. and offers funding, programs and incentives designed to speed up the transition to green energy and to the development of green technologies. It's \$369 billion directed at reducing carbon emissions to fight climate change while also lowering energy costs for consumers and small businesses. It will create goodpaying jobs in America's growing clean energy economy and manufacturing sectors and help the consumer cover the costs of making the transition to greener living. Toward this goal, tax credits and rebates are being offered for:

- Rooftop solar
- Cost of home energy audits

• Home improvements to reduce energy leakage such as weatherstripping and caulking

• Home improvements and weatherization including upgraded windows, doors and insulation

• Energy efficient appliances including electric stoves, cooktops, ranges, ovens, and clothes dryers

• Energy efficient electric heating & cooling appliances like heat pumps, central air conditioners & water heaters

• Upgrade of a home's breaker box and electrical wiring

• Electric vehicle purchases, both new and used

The Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC) gives this advice on how to best take advantage of "Congress's big climate moment" in *A Consumer Guide To the Inflation Reduction Act:*

• Make preparations to make the most of your potential benefits, e.g. get a home energy audit.

• Educate yourself on when and how tax credits and rebates will roll out and what purchases apply.

• Put solar panels on your roof.

• Update or install other home renewableenergy options (e.g. wind, geothermal, hydroelectric, batteries).

• Invest in sustainable home improvements.

• Take advantage of rebates for energy efficient upgrades.

• Buy an electric vehicle.

Other provisions of the Inflation Reduction Act include:

- Creation of a 15% corporate minimum tax rate
- Prescription drug price reform
- IRS tax enforcement
- Affordable Care Act (ACA) subsidy extension
- Energy security and climate change investments

# 2023 Peggy Clark Environmental Leadership Awards

Peggy Clark Grassroots Environmental Leadership awards were given at LWVIC's 2023 Spring Membership Meeting to the Blacklick Creek Watershed Association and to Marie Olson of the Indiana Community Garden.

## **Group Award**

The Blacklick Creek Watershed Association (BCWA) was formed in 1993 as non-profit 501(c)3 organization. Since its inception, the primary focus of BCWA has been addressing the numerous sources of acid mine drainage (AMD) within the watershed.

The Association has completed 13 mine drainage and reclamation projects in the Blacklick Creek Watershed. The organization was instrumental in securing and managing a number of DEP Growing Greener and other grants which resulted in the construction of a series of successful passive AMD treatment systems. These efforts culminated in the BCWA receiving the PA DEP Governor's Award for Environmental Excellence. These systems remain in existence today.

One of the most exciting developments is that the PA DEP is constructing an active treatment plant on the main stem of the Blacklick Creek near Wehrum along the Ghost Town Trail. The plant will treat the discharges from Vinton #6 Mine, Redmill Mine and the Wehrum mines. This will restore over 25 miles of the main stream of the Blacklick Creek, bringing back life and vitality to this area again after so many years.

## 2023 Peggy Clark Environmental Leadership Awards Individual Award

More than 11 years ago, Marie Olson had a vision of a community garden for Indiana, PA. She believes in the power of gardens to heal communities. The Indiana Community Garden (ICG) has expanded over the years to add demonstrations of water harvesting with rain barrels, a covered pavilion with picnic tables, a schoolhouse, community garden beds for public and private use, murals and other art projects. In the last two years, Marie's vision was crucial in developing the ICG's pollinator meadow and the first food forest in our county.

Also in the last two years Marie was one of the leaders who revitalized the Chevy Chase Community Garden. Her vision for this garden included fruit trees and is now referred to as the Chevy Chase Food Forest. Marie and other volunteers harvest fresh produce for the Chevy Chase Community Center's food kitchen and pantry to provide meals free to anyone in the community.

Last year the garden under Marie's guidance celebrated its 10-year anniversary with children's plein air paintings of the garden, a story walk, garden tours, vendor booths, talks about the garden's history and a live concert. The community came out on that beautiful weekend to celebrate all that the garden has become—a community space in all of the best ways, thanks to Marie.

The League's theme, "Your voice is loudest in local elections," underscores the need to have broad voter representation in elections of these officials.

## LWVIC at Nature Palooza

To help children learn about voting, LWVIC held an election for "Your Favorite Woodland Bird" at Family Nature Palooza on June 3. An annual event sponsored by the Children's Advisory Committee of Indiana County, Nature Palooza took place at Blue Spruce Park. The red tail hawk won the election for favorite bird with 30 votes, followed by the wild turkey at 27 votes and the pileated woodpecker at 16 votes. The swan got one write-in vote.

LWVIC also involved children in a Stormwater Run-Off experiment. Opportunity for some water play engaged kids in designing a neighborhood without stormwater collectors and another neighborhood with many kinds of collectors of storm run-off. Children and their families could see how rooftop gardens, rain barrels, forests, rain gardens, and green spaces help protect a neighborhood from flooding in heavy rainfall.

LWVIC volunteers at the festival were Lillian Clemons, Joyce Rizzo, Sara Steelman, and Sue Welsh. Nature Palooza is one of several events each year at which LWVIC introduces children to voting and provides educational fun.
